Minister's Letter

Glasgow City Council is celebrating 2025 as the city's 850th anniversary. It may be that you have already attended a/some 'Glasgow 850' event(s). Between 1175 and 1178 King William I of Scots ('William the



Lion') granted Bishop Jocelin the right to establish a burgh, marking the start of the corporate community of 'Glasgow'.

There are no visible, physical traces of Bishop Jocelin's burgh. Even the cathedral that he knew burnt down and was replaced. The centre of civic life, perhaps initially at the junction of the High Street and Drygate, or around Glasgow Cross, has moved over the years. What began as a small market town has had various incarnations down the centuries. It is still Glasgow, but it is very different from the one that Bishop Jocelin knew – and at times can feel quite different from the one that many of us knew when we were young!

Maybe much the same could be said about the church (and indeed about our own congregation). There are few surviving physical remains that Jesus and the Apostles would have seen: the Western Wall of the Jerusalem Temple, the Theatre in Ephesus and maybe some other ruins in Rome and other towns or villages. Over the centuries the heart of the church moved from the Holy Land and Eastern Mediterranean to Western Europe and North America, but now the growth points seem to be Africa, Asia and South America.

The city motto, registered with the Lyon Court in 1866, is 'Let Glasgow flourish'. This is acknowledged to be based on an engraving

of a bell from 1631 in the former Tron Church 'Lord let Glasgow flourish through the preaching of thy word and the praising of thy name.'

In the 2020s most of the population of Glasgow would find it hard to relate to that engraving, even understand what it means. For all the vibrancy that does exist in our city, there are also many serious social, health, crime and other issues. Preaching from pulpits or street corners may not address these issues, but the message of Jesus, the message about Jesus — about how outlook, values and behaviour can be changed, with self-interest being replaced by loving-care and service — is one that our city, our country and our world needs desperately to hear and respond to positively.

We have no idea what our congregation, city or world will be like in the next 50 years, let alone 850, but we go forward trusting in the care and goodness of God, challenged by him to continue proclaiming his word and praising his name.





Support the foodbank

St Gregory's independent food bank is based at the chapel of St Gregory's RC Church in Wyndford. It operates free of overheads such as rent and heating costs and is staffed entirely by a dedicated team of unpaid volunteers. We at St John's Renfield Church make a monthly donation which helps to ensure that a balanced range of food stuffs can be distributed to needy and vulnerable people in our society.

There is an ever increasing demand for tinned meatballs, tomatoes, curry, spagehetti, tuna and many other items with a long shelf life such as sugar, long life milk, tea, coffee, sugar, pasta and pet food (for dogs and cats). Toiletries are also welcome such as nappies (size 3 and above, especially size 5), baby wipes, shampoo, etc.

While contributions of any of the above are very welcome a particular way in which we at St John's can help is by providing empty egg boxes (size for 6 eggs) and durable bags. At present jars are not needed.

Well over 300 bags are distributed every

week to close to 1000 people.


